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2006 will be one of the best rallies ever! Vermont is an outstanding riding locale. Small town America is around every corner. I grew up near [Bennington](#) and much of Vermont is where I rode my first motorcycle. I hit a patch of gravel and went through a barbed wire fence. More about that when I meet you in person.

The first thing you will want to do in Vermont is to cut back on the throttle. Vermont's roads are not intended for high speeds. There are a couple of interstate slabs replete with 18 wheelers and cages trying to catch the clock with the speedometer. But just throttle back and enjoy an America that has not been part of the East Coast for a long time.

When first starting this project I hoped to put together 25 pages and perhaps 100 locations. At present there are 43 pages and over 200 links. The last refinement is a spreadsheet with just the basic information to help you plan your trip. It's all a work in progress with a life of its own.

Passing 100 links I sent an email to BMW MOA's Director Michael Friedle. "You are in deep doo doo, I opined. There is not enough time to do even half of Vermont in that time." 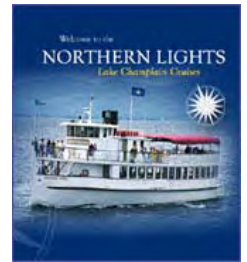

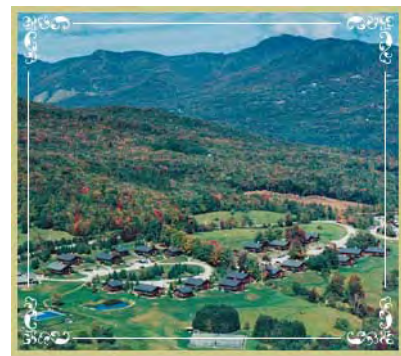

Route 100 by Furious Rides, brief sample: "Move at a leisurely pace to the Kensico Dam Circle where the Bronx River Parkway ends and the Taconic State Parkway begins. Drive at about 60 mph along the winding 4-lane parkway, i.e., that speed avoids being caught at any of the few traffic lights that line the very southern portion of the road in Westchester and Putnam Counties. As we reach Fahnestock State Park, the road begins to climb into the southern fringes of the Taconic Mountain Range. Exit the Parkway at the Park entrance and ride around some of the trails looking for a spot near a stream to stop and drink our cocoa. Then, continue leisurely drive up to Ghent and the local diner on the Parkway for lunch. Continue up to the turnaround overlooking the Hudson River at the bridge between Rensselaer and Albany. ...
